Michigan State commits to railway business women

Besides sponsoring NARBW Capsule, Michigan State University has focused some of it's curriculum to cater to railway business women (see pg. 6).

MSU's four-week Railway Management Certificate Program is the only North American program that covers the breadth and depth of the very complex railway industry from both a conceptual and practical viewpoint.

The program is aimed at individuals with the potential to become senior managers and leaders in their organizations. Content is applicable to the whole rail industry - freight and passenger railroads, transit authorities, industry and regulatory agencies, suppliers, and shippers. Critical and topical subjects are covered in a classroom setting with interactive discussions and field trips to aid learning. These include railroad facilities, customers, suppliers, associations, and agencies. Group project work applies learning and develops teamwork skills.

The program was developed by MSU Railway Management Program staff, evaluated and improved by a curriculum committee of railroad industry leaders. Subject matter experts for the program include distinguished railroaders, transportation industry leaders and experienced MSU faculty.

Four individual weeks of classroom and field experiences link to online support with assigned instructors responsible for mentoring the learning experience. A Certificate in Railway Management will be awarded on completion of the program.


