Resume of the 2021 NARBW National Convention

Jacksonville, Florida

The 77<sup>th</sup> NARBW Convention formal opening was on Friday, May 21, 2021, at the Double Tree by Hilton Hotel Jacksonville Riverfront Hotel. National President Melanie McKim opened the meeting, followed by the invocation given by Jasmine Manley of the Chicago Chapter. We were honored to have Jacksonville Boy Scout Troop #106 Color Guard Present the Colors and lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

During the first business meeting on May 21<sup>st</sup> Credentials Chairman Lisa Stout, Indianapolis Circle City Chapter, announced the delegate quorum of forty-two members. On the second day of business the quorum was reported as forty-two members. Twelve out of sixteen chapters were represented at convention.

First Vice President Rhonda Gomez introduced the ten women nominated by their chapters for National Woman of the Year. At the Presidents' Brunch, Second Vice President Renee Noble introduced the Chapter Presidents and National Past Presidents. First Vice President Rhonda Gomez announced Chrystal Tonkin-Corum, Kansas City Chapter, as the 2021 Woman of the Year. Welfare Chairman Vanessa Estelle announced that nineteen women representing seven chapters had donated more than \$300 or 300 hours during the past year. Our total welfare contributions were \$55,782.50 and 4,868 hours.

Christina Stallings, CSX Senior Technical director and Kim Bowling, CSX Director Car Monitoring and Diagnostics were our speakers on May 21<sup>st</sup>.

On Saturday May 22nd Membership Chairman Chrystal Tonkin-Corum held a wonderful tribute to our deceased members at the Memorial Service.

We began our Saturday business meeting with Rory Diamond who spoke to us about K-9 for Warriors. Publication Chairman Nancy Von Dolteren gave a presentation about the NARBW website. Melanie McKim introduced 'From the Beginning', the 100 Year Anniversary publication and thanked the committee for compiling this historic summary of our wonderful organization.

The Membership Luncheon was hosted by Third Vice President Chrystal Tonkin-Corum. Our guest speaker was Emily Foltz-Holland, LMHC, CCTP, CPC, LPC, Pace Center for Girls. The afternoon Public Affairs Speaker was Clarence Gooden, retired CSX.

The installation of officers was conducted by Sandy Hall, Past National President and Emeritus Council Member:

The National Proposed Budget was reviewed and approved with no changes made.

# **Quarterly Event**

September 11, 2021 is the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 9/11 attacks. This day is traditionally one to honor and remember the 2,977 lives lost on that terrible day (including 412 first responders).

People say you will always remember where you were on 9/11/2001 when the terrorist attacks occurred. Let us all pay tribute to the brave men, women and children who perished on that fateful day.



Patricia Szalapski of the Twin Cities chapter passed away February 13, 2021 at the age of 90.


Patricia was an active member of the Church of St. Casimir, the Altar and Rosary Society, and longtime funeral lunch coordinator.


