RESUME OF SUMMER BOARD MEETING - JULY 8, 2023

The meeting was held on July 8, 2023, at the Fairfield Inn Las Vegas Convention Center in Las Vegas, NV. All members of the National Board were present. The meeting began at 8:00AM and ended at 5:15PM (pacific time).

Treasury Reports: were presented and included the fiscal year-end reports for June 1, 2022, through May 31, 2023.

Board Members Plans of Work: Plans of work and related forms from each board member were reviewed and discussed. Motions to approve, and approve "as submitted or amended", were unanimous. All final reports and forms will be distributed in accordance with the NARBW By-Laws and published on the NARBW.org website.

National Convention Chairwoman Kadie Leslie presented an update on the 80th NARBW Annual Convention being held on May 17-18, 2024, at the Embassy Suites by Hilton Omaha Downtown/Old Market Omaha, NE. The pre-convention tour is planned for Thursday, May 16, 2024. The theme for Fun Night is Board Games. A proposed schedule and budget have been prepared and discussed. To help with high registration fees, convention costs related to meeting space rentals, audio visual equipment, President's lunch fees for chapter presidents, and event insurance cost as required will be borne by the national general fund. The Operating Budget which had been approved at the 2023 National Convention in San Diego was amended and approved by the Board to reflect these costs.


We also conducted a Zoom call to discuss our future activities.

As part of advocating for women and elevating their voices in the public transportation workforce, our chapter president introduced a Speaker's Bureau--a group of volunteers from various disciplines covering important topics that women face personally and professionally. The objective is to promote positive dialogue and build community support among our members and the other chapters of the NARBW organization.



At our September monthly membership meeting on Sept. 16, Dr. Carola Gregorich, joined SoCal NARBW to present: "Growing Purpose into Infectious Passion – Railroading in Owens Valley."

Berlin-born Dr. Gregorich is a world-renowned radio-analytical and nuclear chemist with a nerd-like fascination with Rail. She shared her passion for Railroading and explained the history of the Owens Valley, a complex weave of Native American, ranching, mining, railroading, power generation, and water war history. She explained how mining triggered the building of the railroad in the region where she now lives and volunteers for the Carson & Colorado Railway and the Laws Railroad Museum and Historical Site and is a Historic Site board member.

She spoke about a historical event she helped produce in March of 2023 when the County of Inyo, The Laws Museum in Bishop, and the Carson & Colorado Railway jointly celebrated 140 years of railroading in Owens Valley.

The event featured the revival of Southern Pacific steam locomotive #18 ("Slim Princess") – a 1911 Baldwin 4-6-0 that was built for the Nevada–California–Oregon Railway (NCO) and worked the rest of its career on SP's narrow-gauge lines

before retiring in 1954. After many decades and many volunteer hours, Engine 18 steamed again and has captured the attention of national railroaders.



For the event, the engine was trucked from its home at the Eastern California Museum in Independence, Calif., for a two-weekend run at the Laws Railroad Museum on its short piece of mainline track. Event-goers were able to enjoy rides on a caboose pulled by the classic engine.

Dr. Gregorich ended her presentation by explaining two major railroad projects underway at the Laws Museum: understanding whether or not SP 9 may be able to steam again, and a track extension to the south to make the total track length almost one mile long.

Blackstone District

Its history starts in the mid-1880s when beautiful stone and brick residences were built in a westward expansion. The Blackstone Hotel was built in 1915 and was a family hotel (meaning it rented to families by the year). In 1920, the Blackstone Hotel changed to an actual hotel, with a Pierce Arrow auto that picked up visiting dignitaries at the train station. The famous Reuben Sandwich was dreamed up by a local grocer (Reuben Kulakofsky) in 1925, to feed the late-night poker players staying at the hotel. Today, the area restaurants hold "Reuben Challenges" as fundraisers for various charities.

The 1929 stock market crash meant families were no longer able to maintain the extravagant residences and many were converted to boarding houses or funeral homes. The area became known as "Funeral Home Row". As the economy grew, the area expanded and is now home to the University of Nebraska Medical Center as well as numerous restaurants, trendy night spots, banks, and other business. The converted large houses are still there, although they are being replaced by apartment buildings for students. The Blackstone Hotel is still a hotel but refurbished and renamed the Cottonwood Hotel. The original hotel is home to several businesses and an addition has been added for more hotel guests.

Lauritzen Gardens

A generous donation from the Lauritzen family began the Gardens; a 100-acre public garden on a bluff overlooking the Missouri River. Since opening in 1982, new gardens are created or expanded annually

The construction of the Rose garden, a popular wedding site, began in 1995. The visitor and education center has a large floral display hall, which is amazing at Christmas; and hosts exciting floral and art displays year-round. The spring bulb show should be on display when we are there. The gift shop, café, and patio are always interesting. There is a model railroad in the garden and the Conservatory will be open. We have arranged for the tram to take us on a trip 'round the gardens. For those who want to stretch their legs, there are numerous walking trails.

On the South side of the gardens is Kenefick Park, named for John Kenefick a former chairman and CEO of Union Pacific Railroad. The park is accessible but there are several flights of steps. It is the "welcome to Omaha" when traveling West on I-80 from Iowa.

80TH NATIONAL CONVENTION OMAHA MAY 17- 18, 2024

The NARBW Omaha Chapter is honored to host the 80th National Convention in Omaha, so that we may celebrate the accomplishments of our NARBW members. The theme of 2024 Convention is "Stronger Together," which is symbolized by the strength of the tree, which you will see in various locations at the convention.

The history of Omaha, Nebraska began before the settlement of the city, with speculators from neighboring Council Bluffs, Iowa staking land across the Missouri River illegally as early as the 1840s. When it was legal to claim land in Indian Country, the Lone Tree Ferry brought settlers from Council Bluffs to Omaha. A treaty with the Omaha Tribe allowed the creation of the Nebraska Territory, and Omaha City was founded on July 4, 1854. Thus was the beginning of Omaha, the now small city with big city enjoyments to offer.

Today the most recognizable district in Omaha, the Old Market, is a charming spot day or night. It runs from Farnam Street on the north side to Jones Street on the south side, and from 10th Street on the east side to 13th Street on the west side. What once was Omaha's bustling produce and market center now is full of restaurants, quirky stores and boutiques. The brick roads remain, and the warehouses now are condos and bars.

The Omaha Riverfront is parks, parks, and more parks. They stretch from the Kiewitt Luminarium north of the hotel, to the south along the Missouri River and Heartland of America Park. Put on your walking shoes or rent a bicycle to enjoy the sights.
