RESUME OF THE NATIONAL CONVENTION

May 20-21, 2019

The 75th NARBW Convention formal opening was on Monday, May 20, 2019, at Bally's Atlantic City, Atlantic City NJ. The President, Melanie McKim, opened the meeting, followed by the invocation given by, Rae Huebner, National Scholarship Chairman, of the Philadelphia Chapter. We were honored to have the Presentation of Colors done by the Cape – May Detachment, Marine Corps League - 194, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance lead by Rhonda Gomez, National Jewelry Chairman, Kansas City Chapter.

The First Vice President, Sylvia Long, introduced the eleven women nominated by their chapters for National Woman of the Year.

The Second Vice President, Joan Waite, introduced the Chapter and National Past Presidents at the Presidents' Brunch. Sylvia Long announced Diane Huntington, St. Louis Chapter, as the 2019 - Woman of the Year. She has worked the red-carpet runaway for the Night To Shine event for 125 special needs adults. Diane donates hundreds of hours to the AMVETS (American Veterans) Ladies Auxiliary. Her organization raised funds for Veterans in her community and she has held other fundraisers and donated funds to VA Medical Centers in Missouri.

Nine of our ladies attended the convention in Atlantic City.





Courtney, Amy and Cle attended their first convention and received gifts from Philadelphia Chapter.






