The Chicago Chapter will host its Centennial Anniversary celebration on Saturday, November 1st. Founded on November 13, 1925, as the second NARBW chapter, this milestone event marks a hundred years of dedication and service — a truly historic occasion for our organization. Let us come together to recognize their remarkable legacy and demonstrate our support for the Chicago Chapter as they commemorate this significant achievement.

The National Board convened for its Summer Board Meeting via Zoom on July 19th, where several important topics were discussed. A key focus of the meeting was the ongoing revision of the NARBW Purpose, as outlined in our (National Constitution and Bylaws. This initiative was originally introduced during our recent convention, at which time a link was shared with members to invite feedback and suggestions. To further gather input, a survey was distributed in July. This project is still in the early stages, and member contributions remain vital as we continue to refine and update our organization's purpose.

The Convention Handbook is currently undergoing revisions to ensure it reflects the latest information and guidance. We will provide additional details soon, and the updated handbook will be made available on our website for all members to access.

During our upcoming 2026 Roanoke Convention, members will have the opportunity to participate in elections for three key national officer positions: National President, National 1st Vice President, and National Treasurer. These elections are an important part of our organization's governance and provide members with a voice in selecting our leadership for the next term.

Eligibility Requirements

- National President and National 1st Vice President: Candidates must have previously served as a chapter president and completed at least one year of service on the national board.
- National Treasurer: Candidates are required to have been a chapter member for at least one year.
- The deadline for submitting nominations is Sunday, January 18, 2026. All nominations should be sent to Ida Carmouche, our National Nominations Chair. If you have any questions regarding the process, eligibility, or the positions themselves, please reach out to Ida or contact any current or former national board member for guidance. See Ida's letter on page 4 for more details on the nominations process

We held a Town Hall Meeting on August 2, 2025, where we encouraged our National Board officers to integrate their conference calls with town hall sessions throughout the year. Each officer will host additional meetings later in the year to keep members informed about important dates and updates. A Master Class Town Hall event will be hosted by the Emeritus Council and is scheduled for January 10th. Stay tuned for more details. Please be sure to check your email regularly for announcements and further details!

We regret to share that the Central Florida Chapter has made the difficult decision to dissolve. While we honor and respect their choice and the circumstances behind it, it's truly bittersweet to see the closing of a chapter that has made meaningful contributions to our sisterhood. Their legacy will remain a valued part of our history.

RESUME OF THE WINTER BOARD MEETING July 12, 2025

The Summer Board Meeting was held via Zoom on July 19, 2025, with 12 board members and the Emeritus council chair in attendance. The meeting began at 9:00am CT and ended at 4:55pm CT.

- Plans of Work: All board members presented their Plans of Work, which were reviewed and approved (as submitted or amended). Final Plans are due to the Secretary by July 25 and will be distributed to the National Board, Chapter Presidents, Emeritus Council, and Members-at-large by August 8.
- Key Action Items from Plans of Work: The Benevolent Fund will be reinstated in the President's Handbook.
 Chapter by-laws will be reviewed to clarify "active" member status. Florida's 10-year anniversary certificate
 will be mailed in July. Forms will be converted to Excel format. Minnesota nonprofit renewal will be filed by
 December 31. The convention charm will be submitted for approval. Board members will confirm they have
 current by-law books. A scholarship fundraising and application meeting will be scheduled.
- Unfinished Business: Board members will confirm letters of introduction and USB handoffs. Chairs will
 review their duties monthly. The Treasurer will explore alternative payment options and contact printers
 about the convention book. Past convention chairs will review the handbook. The Convention Chair will
 verify ribbon options for first-time attendees. The Emeritus Council will review the convention book for
 wording and punctuation.
- New Business: Shamonda Jones was named 2027 Convention Chair. Hotel scouting is underway. The Welfare Chair will distribute the NARBW Purpose Survey by July 30. Growth & Engagement Initiatives: The board discussed ways to increase member engagement. Members-at-large will be integrated into chapter and national activities. First Town Hall is scheduled for August 2, 2025. A Master Class with the Emeritus Council will be held on January 10, 2026. NARBW will celebrate Women's History Month. Conference calls will align with Town Hall meetings. Members are encouraged to sign up. The Zoom subscription will be maintained. The Welfare Chair will research electronic forms.
- **Upcoming Meetings:** The Winter Board Meeting will take place January 30–31, 2026, in Florida.

A Legacy of Goodwill, History, and Hospitality

The story of the NARBW China Exhibit Car is a fascinating blend of ambition, philanthropy, and preservation—rooted in the mission of the National Association of Railway Business Women (NARBW) to foster cooperation and understanding within the railroad industry.

The Goodwill Train to China: A Vision of International Friendship

In the mid-20th century, the NARBW envisioned a bold initiative: a "Goodwill Train" that would travel across the United States, showcasing American culture and generosity, with the ultimate goal of sending the exhibit to China. Though the project was never fully realized—likely due to geopolitical shifts and logistical challenges—it remains a powerful example of the NARBW's commitment to international goodwill and cultural exchange.

Key Aspects of the Goodwill Train Project:

- The China Connection: The exhibit was intended as a gesture of friendship toward the Chinese people.
- The Exhibit Car: It would have displayed American-made goods and cultural artifacts.
- NARBW's Role: As a women-led organization, NARBW's efforts reflected its broader mission of service, education, and unity.

Though the train never left U.S. soil, the idea lives on as a notable chapter in the history of railway diplomacy.

The China Exhibit Car: Preserving the Elegance of Rail Travel

In 2012, the Green Bay Chapter of NARBW brought a new vision to life with the Christopher Railroad China Exhibit at the National Railroad Museum in Green Bay, Wisconsin. This exhibit showcases a stunning collection of historic dining car China, donated by the chapter and curated to highlight the social and cultural history of American railroads. Named for collector William Christopher, the exhibit features elegant tableware once used in luxury dining cars. Its purpose is to educate visitors about the golden age of rail travel and the role of women in preserving its legacy. Founded in 1941, NARBW continues to support educational and historical initiatives across the country.

A similar exhibit is now housed at the Lake Superior Railroad Museum in Duluth, Minnesota. This beautifully restored car features one of the largest displays of railroad dining China in the U.S., offering a nostalgic journey through the artistry and hospitality of train travel.
